Personal data: The author of a binational doctorate (Romance & Comparative Literature), Markus Arnold is Associate Professor of French and Francophone studies at the University of Cape Town (UCT). He has previously taught in Lyon, France (*École Normale Supérieure*) and La Réunion (University & *Ecole Supérieure d'Art*) and his interests comprise comparative and Francophone literatures of the Global South (notably Indian Ocean), postcolonial theory, cultural studies, and text-image relations. His publications include the monograph *La littérature mauricienne contemporaine* (2017), the co-edited books *L'image et son dehors* (2017) and *Borders and Ecotones in the Indian Ocean* (2020), and a co-edited special issue on African literary and artistic manifestos (*FSSA* 51.2, 2021). He held research fellowships and visiting professorships at the Sorbonne-Nouvelle in Paris (2021) and the Maison Francaise of Oxford (2022), and is part of the "VC 2030 Future Leaders Programme" at UCT, and the chief-editor of the journal *French Studies in Southern Africa*

Current research focus: Within a critical framework of the circulation in Global South literatures, Prof Arnold currently works on the articulation of Indian Ocean / Caribbean and African thought though notions such as 'Afropolitanism', 'Afrotopia', 'Creolization' and 'Ecotones'. He is involved in various international research projects, such as "Thanatic Ethics: The circulation of bodies in migratory space" (2020-2024), "Spaces of Precarity: Migration, Spatiality and the Refugee Graphic Narrative" (2022-2024), and "NOVI – The Norms of Life" (2023-2027).
